EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The contents of this report will give you an in-depth look at everything we've managed to accomplish during the 2023-2024 year.

You'll hear from our Executive Director, Board Chair, and learn more about our impactful programs, such as 'Enhancing Sexual and Reproductive Health for Women and Adolescents' (ESWA) and 'Project 302.' You will also see more details comparing how our work this year compared to previous years.

We're happy to report that in 2023-2024, CPAR's Ethiopia program continued to deliver outstanding results through the ESWA project, reaching over 708,000 women and girls with improved sexual and reproductive health services. Additionally, the Project 302 initiative empowered 25,000 adolescents in Addis Ababa with leadership and educational opportunities, while gaining recognition from the Ethiopian government for efforts in combating gender-based violence.

In Malawi, CPAR's Green Schools Network improved access to Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene (WASH) infrastructure and promoted sustainable agriculture practices, benefitting over 1,400 students. Furthermore, in response to the nation's severe cholera outbreak, CPAR partnered with UNICEF to provide critical aid and WASH support to over 58,000 individuals.

In Canada, CPAR raised funds for its work in Africa by engaging Canadians in international development issues and fostering public action. This year, Canadian volunteers contributed to resource development and supported project proposals, underscoring the vital role of collaboration in achieving CPAR's goals.

Dear Donors and Partners,

This year, CPAR continued its mission to address some of Africa's most pressing challenges. In Ethiopia, over 61% of people living with HIV are women aged 15 and older, while 13% of teenage girls (ages 15-19) are mothers or pregnant. In Malawi, a severe cholera outbreak, exacerbated by inadequate sanitation, affected over 58,000 people, while thousands of adolescents in Ethiopia remained without leadership and educational opportunities.

In response, we continued supporting 56 health facilities with the necessary supplies and training to provide youth-friendly sexual and reproductive health (SRH) services. Our emergency cholera intervention in Malawi supported over 301,000 individuals, providing access to clean water and sanitation facilities. Additionally, we empowered 715 students in Addis Ababa through education and leadership training, helping to create a generation of informed and resilient youth.

As we look forward, we remain committed to reaching even more communities, closing the gaps in healthcare, education, and sanitation. Join us in building a future where health, dignity, and opportunity are rights enjoyed by all. Consider donating today and making a lasting impact.







Why Were Fewer Health Workers, Health Facilities and Schools Reached in 2023-24?

The ESWA project, a five-year initiative that significantly contributed to the results achieved in Health Facilities for previous fiscal years, was phased out this year. Additionally, more funds were allocated to emergency WASH needs this year. Through this, 132 more schools benefitted from WASH awareness campaigns; these schools were not included in the figure above depicting direct school support.

Why Not Include the Over 2 Million People Reached by WASH Messages?

While over 2 million people in Malawi were provided sanitation and hygiene awareness information, including through door-to-door visits, radio programs, community meetings and school initiatives, these activities primarily provided information and awareness rather than direct project support.

WHAT WE WORKED ON

ESWA

'Enhancing Sexual and Reproductive Health for Women and Girls', also known as 'ESWA'. CPAR and Global Affairs Canada (GAC) joined forces to support the delivery of the National Ethiopian curriculum for sexual reproductive health (SRH), as well as to support the capacity building of healthcare system's SRH services for women and adolescents in the Amhara and Oromia Regional States of Ethiopia. This has directly impacted the lives of 708,458 women and girls. The project has met all of its goals, which include reducing the number of births among women under age 18 and lowering the maternal mortality rate. CPAR Ethiopia recently received an award from the Ethiopian government recognizing its work to combat Gender-Based Violence (GBV).

PROJECT 302

'Commemorating Victims of Ethiopian Airlines Flight 302' (or Project 302) is bringing lasting and positive change to 25,000+ adolescents in eleven Addis Ababa high schools through a broad outreach program focused on education, health, career and social development, and environmental change. This project is funded by Transport Canada to honour the memories of the 157 plane crash victims from Ethiopian Airlines Flight 302. The project supports the causes their families and friends care about, while making a real and lasting impact in their memory.


CHOLERA RESPONSE

In response to Malawi's severe cholera outbreak, CPAR, in partnership with UNICEF, launched an urgent intervention across eight high-risk districts, including those affected by Cyclone Freddy. From June 21 to December 31, 2023, the project reached over 2.3 million people with life-saving cholera prevention efforts. This included providing safe water to 242,525 individuals, improving sanitation for 58,635 people, and constructing or rehabilitating 40 water sources.

Additionally, CPAR distributed WASH supplies to 23,323 people and conducted awareness campaigns, benefiting 2.04 million individuals. The initiative also supported 26 schools with essential WASH infrastructure and 134 schools through educational campaigns, helping to build a more resilient, healthier community.

GREEN SCHOOLS NETWORK

The Green Schools Network (GSN) Project was launched in Malawi in 2016, scaling activities from a similar project "Primary School Rainwater Harvesting" in Tanzania. The incorporation of agriculture into everyday school life for students not only feeds today's school children, but the lessons in permaculture are being adopted by the communities. This project has already benefitted 15,600 students with 13 rainwater harvesting tanks built. As the project enters its 2024-25 phase, ongoing support is essential to expand its positive impact for both students and surrounding communities.

STORIES OF CHANGE

ABENEZER (17, name changed)

is one of the most outstanding students of Mesrak Goh secondary school and the seventh son in a family that struggles to meet the basic needs of their children. Although his family struggles to meet basic daily needs, his participation in CPAR's youth leadership training changed his life. He recalls: "I had no clue about the outside world and felt like I missed the best spices of life."

At first, Abenezer hesitated, seeing the training as a distraction from his studies. However, after learning about CPAR's program, he had what he calls an "AHA moment" and decided to give it a try. He was one of 25 candidates selected to represent his school, and he describes the training as "life-changing." Afterward, he experienced a complete shift in mindset: "I understand the importance of general equality beliefs... the thoughts I have on social inclusion are way more developed after the training as well as my thoughts on volunteerism."

Abenezer was also inspired by an exposure visit to Ethiopian Airlines arranged by CPAR. "Wow, I got all my answers! Above all, discipline, work ethic, and commitment to pursue a career and be successful." He shares: "All of this happened because of CPAR and its dedicated team members to help people have a better tomorrow. I can't thank you enough for the opportunity you brought to my life. Just want to say I will make it count!"








Sarah (name changed), a 15-year-old girl from a rural community in Jidda Woreda, Ethiopia, was a victim of abduction and sexual abuse, threatening her safety and future. With support from CPAR and local partners, she was able to access urgent medical and psychological care, and today, she has returned to school and is rebuilding her life with courage and determination. CPAR continues to support her journey, providing resources and connections that strengthen her resilience. Her story is a testament to the impact of community support and determination in overcoming hardship. She was the first victim of abduction in the region that went back to school.

Jade (name changed), a 14-year-old female student from a primary school in rural Malawi: "We used to have a long queue waiting for someone to come out from a latrine due to inadequate sanitary facilities at our school," Jade further explained that due to the lack of adequate latrines at her school, many students were not able to access the limited latrines during school hours, which resulted in students openly defecating in the nearby school bushes and the school not being considered hygienic.


Austen (name changed), a 14-year-old male student from a primary school in rural Malawi: "We used to do open defecation in the nearby school bush. Thanks go to CPAR for assisting us with durable latrines and a rainwater harvesting tank from where we will be drawing water to clean the newly constructed latrines. I am very happy."



WHAT DID FUNDS GO TOWARDS?



INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENT

PROJECTS: Programs focused on strengthening healthcare systems (Ethiopia); Addressing WASH issues by educating teachers and students in permaculture, conservation agriculture, environmental conservation, and hygiene (Malawi); and Registration costs to maintain operations (Tanzania).

CANADIAN OVERSIGHT: Help educate the public about international development issues. **FUNDRAISING:** Internal fundraising efforts within CPAR to maximize our donor reach and potential impact.

ADMIN: Most of our administrative fees this year went towards salaries for our small team in Canada.

An average of 72 cents of every donation dollar spent has directly supported our charitable programs (Ethiopia - Malawi -Tanzania). As we continue to examine ways to grow and diversify our revenue stream, we are deeply committed to ensuring donations are directed towards our mission of building health system capacity and supporting healthy lives in low-resourced regions.

Our small and efficient team is critical to keeping our overall fundraising costs at 7.9%, and our administration costs at 4.4%.

CPAR's fiscal year runs from April 1st to March 31st. Our annual audit and financial statements were completed this year (2024) by the firm of Welch LLP. This audit can be found under 2023-2024 Financial Statements on the Canadian Physicians for Aid and Relief website at www.cpar.ca.
